Common counselling for IITs and NITs

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NEW DELHI: The government is set to introduce common counselling for admission to the Indian Institutes of Technology (IITs) and National Institutes of Technology (NITs) from the coming academic session 2015-16. The decision came after a technical committee appointed by the HRD ministry recommended the same.

The Delhi high court in October had directed the ministry to resolve the issue of common counselling after it came to it through a PIL by Rajiv Kumar, an IIT Kharagpur professor.

"The decision will address the issue of vacant seats in many IITs. Common counselling will do away with the practice of students holding on to seats in

two or more institutions at the same," an official told HT.

In the past there have been cases of students getting seats in an IIT and also NITs in a popular course. Such students hold on to both the seats for a long time and switch only in the end, leaving many seats vacant.

Last year more than 200 seats in IITs were left vacant.

"It is rather intriguing to know that the IITs and NITs, which are providing consultancy to others on technical matters, are unable to themselves find a solution for synchronising admissions to eliminate or at least minimise the issue of vacant seats," stated the bench.

The court also said that the filling up of vacant seats could not be at the cost of maintaining standards of education and merit in IITs.

IITs, IIMs to roll out free online courses

VISAKHAPATNAM: Union Human Resource Development Minister Smriti Irani on Saturday announced the launch of free online courses by premier institutes such as the Indian Institutes of Technology (IITs) and the Indian Institutes Management (IIMs) from the current year.

She was speaking after laying the foundation stone for the IIM, Visakhapatnam, the first among 11 premier educational institutes promised for Andhra Pradesh in the Andhra Pradesh Reorganisation Act, 2014, at Gambheeram on the outskirts of the

city. The State government allotted 388 acres for the country's 14th IIM, which will be mentored by the IIM. Bangalore.

The institute will function from the Andhra University campus till its own campus is ready. Admissions are under way for the academic year 2015-16.

Ms. Irani said that as part of the digital initiatives and education reforms launched by Prime Minister Narendra Modi, consultations on the New Education Policy would begin on January 26. A nominal fee would be charged for certification of various online courses. It would be free for people with special abilities and those belonging to the Scheduled Castes and Scheduled Tribes.

Introducing a common entrance test for central varsities could reduce entry costs considerably

The ministry of human resource development and minister Smriti Irani are currently under fire for their alleged role in IITDelhi director Raghunath Shevgaonkar's exit. There have, however, been other important developments in higher education recently.

There are indications that the HRD ministry has near-immediate plans to introduce a Common Entrance Test (CET) for students seeking admission to central universities, possibly this year, along the lines of the Common Admission Test (CAT) that is mandatory for entry into post-graduate management programmes. At present, some of the best central universities such as Jawaharlal Nehru University hold separate entrance exams and only seven central universities —in Haryana, Jammu, Jharkhand, Kashmir, Kerala, Rajasthan and Tamil Nadu — admit students in part based on their performance in the Central Universities Common Entrance Test.

The CET was first proposed by former HRD minister Kapil Sibal for the new central universities that were set up under the 11th Plan. In August 2012, nearly all central universities agreed to hold the CET from the following year but that did not happen.

The CET is part of a broader set of the HRD ministry's initiatives to bring about greater standardisation across the 45 central universities in the country, perhaps through the implementation of the proposed common legislation for central universities. Some of the initiatives under consideration, notably faculty mobility and a

common curriculum across central universities, are quite regressive, with the potential to do more harm than any good. However, the HRD ministry is absolutely right in pushing for the CET.

If adopted, the CET will reduce entry costs for students by eliminating the unnecessary burden of multiple tests and travel across the country at personal expense and time to seek admission into various central universities. If Irani can get the CET rolling this year or the next, it would arguably be her first real achievement as a minister.

There is opposition to the CET in some quarters on the grounds that it will discriminate against students belonging to rural and remote areas in far-flung states with poor access to higher education. The argument is that out-of-state students, especially those with an English-advantage, will push locals to 'lesser' state-run universities or even deny them education in their home state. Such criticisms are not only unwarranted but also ignore the larger purpose of central universities.

First, students from across the country are unlikely to rush to central universities in remote locations unless those institutions offer at least half-decent education. Many central universities, whether new or old, are perceived as lesser alternatives to better-located and/or reasonably well-run state universities and many private institutions.

Also, a large number of students who seek admission to post-graduate programmes (most central universities offer only a relatively small number of undergraduate programmes) do so in order to be stationed on a university campus while they prepare for one competitive exam or another. These students prefer city-located universities, which offer good facilities to prepare for such exams, over central universities in 'lesser' locations.

Second, the fear that the CET will shut out locals can be easily addressed by reserving a certain percentage of seats for in-state students. Currently, while some central universities do not have reserved seats for local students, many do. The government can, in consultation with state governments, reach an agreement on the issue.

Critics of the CET also forget that central universities, as flagship institutions of our higher education system, are expected not only to bring good quality education closer to people in different parts of the country but to also serve as models for state universities in terms of both teaching and research. Therefore, they must be 'open' rather than 'closed' to absorbing significant numbers of outsiders, both students and faculty, to grow to their full potential.

Manjul Bhargava to lead Prime Minister Narendra Modi's teach in India programme

NEW DELHI: Fields medallist Manjul Bhargava will be the face and facilitator of Prime Minister Narendra Modi's pet education project to rope in eminent scholars and scientists abroad to teach students at IITs and central universities.

Bhargava, who is the first person of Indian origin to win the coveted international prize for his work in mathematics, met HRD Minister Smriti Irani last Thursday and agreed to 'recruit' scientists in the US and across the world to participate in the Global Initiative of Academic network (GIAN), a shortterm teaching programme under which scholars abroad will be invited to teach in India.

"I travel between India and US a lot and I'm familiar with scientists who are passionate about education. My role would be to recruit them and tell them about this wonderful programme. I think the government felt that I am in a unique position to set up these matches," Bhargava told ET.

"They (HRD Ministry) did say that they wanted to use me as the face of this initiative, which I found embarrassing but if it helps the initiative and country then I relent. I'm just here to help," he added. Bhargava, who is a professor at Princeton University, said the he will also teach at IIT Kharagpur and IIT Bombay as part of the initiative.

"I would want to start (GIAN) by this summer and I would want to start this with a bang and bring some really top scientists to India and get people really excited about it," he said.

GIAN is Prime Minister Narendra Modi's brainchild and he had discussed the initiative with US President Barack Obama during his visit to America last October. The project is expected to figure once again on the Indian agenda when Obama arrives here this weekend.

Nomination of 'tainted' BJP MP creates controversy

MEERUT: The decision of the Union HRD ministry to nominate BJP MP from Bijnore, Kunwar Bharatendra to the Aligarh Muslim University Court has provoked widespread condemnation and opposition among people in Aligarh and outside.

His nomination to the AMU body has drawn sharp reaction from the university community which described it as an attempt to "tamper" with the AMU's autonomy and special character.

Civil society in Aligarh and the AMU students' union staged a protest on Saturday against the move. More than half-a-dozen academicians and social activists have petitioned the President of India who is the Visitor of all the Central universities to remove the BJP MP from the highest decision-making body of the university.

The BJP MP has been one of the accused in Muzaffarnagar communal riots cases. Two days back the Union HRD MInistry had commented about its decision to nominate four BJP MPs from western Uttar Pradesh to the AMU court as desired by the Speaker of the Lok Sabha.

"The nomination of the BJP MP who has also been an accused in Muzaffarnagar riots cases, to the Court in a noble seat of learning is going to spell the dubious role of governance at large and is not proper for sane and sorted set up of this great nation," said the letter whose signatories include Dr. Sandeep Pandey, IIT BHU, Prof. Ram Punyani, former faculty IIT Mumbai, Prof. Vipin Tripathi, former faculty member of IIT Delhi and Dr. prem Singh among others.

"We, as Academicians and members of the Civil Society sincerely believe that the appointment of these people to the top decision making body i.e the AMU Court is not a fair play," added the letter.

UGC takes the right step

he University Grants Commission (UGC) notification to bring in a uniform grade and assessment system - the Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) - across universities in India from the coming academic year, is a step in the right direction, the need for which was sorely felt in recent times. With more students migrating to various states outside their homes for higher education, it is becoming difficult to assess the academic quality of a migrating student as each university has its own manner of evaluating students. A plethora of grades, values and marks means it is next to impossible to get a comprehensive idea of how a student is. While common entrance exams are one way of evaluating students from various regions, states and study patterns, a common grading system will obviate the need for added entry tests to get into various courses.

As it stands now, it is an arduous, if not impossible, task to shift from one university to another especially if a student is forced to move mid-way through a course as the rules governing study and assessment are completely different from one to the other. The shift

to the new system will make such movement a lot easier, even if it is not a cakewalk.



The CBCS' other component—to allow students to pick and choose what they want to major in, or as their electives and minor courses under an "a la carte" model—is even more path-breaking. In one swoop, the UGC's move will bring in a fundamental transformation of the higher education system. The Indian university system, among the most rigid in the world, allows no such luxury at the moment. The combination of subjects at the university level is fixed, one cannot mix science with arts or

commerce nor is it possible for students to change their stream mid-way through a course. The choices for the students are limited and fixed. In recent years, some private universities have brought in new combinations and an innovative mix of subjects, yet it is nowhere near a freewheeling choice as in the western education system. For instance, it is even scandalous to contemplate a diverse combination of say, Maths, Music and Economics. It is in such a strait-jacketed system that the UGC now wants the choice to rest with the student. This can make the system flexible and bring out the best in a student. Moreover, innovative combinations have the potential to yank up falling standards and motivate students to do justice to what they have chosen. A win-win situation for the student and the university.

New edu policy to focus on 'cultural integration'

REVAMPED Policy paper covers 32 themes including promotion of Indian languages, rankings of higher institutions

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NEW DELHI: The revamped version of the Centre's education policy is likely to include concepts like "cultural integration through languages", new approaches on teaching science and mathematics in schools and ranking of higher education institutions, among others.

The initial paper prepared by the Union human resource development ministry on the new education policy talks about promotion of Indian languages and it comes in the backdrop of the HRD ministry replacing German with Sanskrit as the third language in Kendriya Vidyalayas across India.

The new policy features would find reflection in the school education curriculum once the policy is in place. School curriculum is normally revised once in 10 years and the last revision took place in 2005.

The policy paper accessed by HT outlines 32 themes covering school and higher education.

While most of the themes are quite specific to the target, the one on cultural integration

through language does not outline its objective.

The themes — 12 for school education and 20 for higher education — will be discussed at the panchayat and block levels with the government filtering people's suggestion through a task force comprising officials from various ministries and eminent people from different fields.

For primary education, the themes include improving

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learning outcomes, reforming school examination systems, revamping teacher education, accelerating rural literacy, new approaches for teaching of science and maths, schools standards, assessment and management systems, and inclusive education.

For higher education, the themes are governance reforms, ranking of institutions and accreditation, quality of regulation, improving state public universities, integrating skill development in higher education, promoting cultural integration through language, private sector partnership, and financing higher education.

The first national policy on education was framed in 1986 and modified in 1992.

HRD clears new NCTE norm

In a major initiative towards improving the quality of teachers' education in the country, the HRD Ministry has approved a set of new regulations based on the recommendations of Justice Verma Commission, which has also suggested measures for checking the mushrooming "business" of teachers training education.

The National Council for Teacher Education (NCTE) has finally released the New Regulations and Norms & Standards for 15 programmes through the Gazette notifica-tion. While the new format covers pre-school, primary, elementary, secondary, senior secondary, art education, physical education, and open and distance learning, the NCTE is also planning to include into its fold yoga education and other forms of special education.

For the first time, NCTE has also succeeded in centralising the database of Visiting Teams (not allowing the regional com-

> "This is probably the first major policy announcement in education by the BJP Government. This change has taken more than two years to happen; and it has not been easy for NCTE to finally come up with such complete overhaul. There has been long and stiff debates in the NCTE Council which is dominated by scholars having inclination to the Left wing. Therefore, there have been compromises especially in respect of the qualifications to

be a teacher educator," said a

HRD Ministry official.
While M.Ed or MA (Education) with B.Ed has been largely retained as the essential qualification, there have been compromises to have social science and science masters with B.Ed or B.El.Ed as qualifications for a few positions. In spite of strong pressure, PhD in science or mathematics education, without any background in teacher education, however could not be included in essential qualification.

This is a victory for the teacher educator community in the country. NCTE has succeeded in preserving the sanctity of grounding in teacher education as essential to become a teacher educator. If the original Poonam Batra Committee report, constituted by the Left-dominated NCTE Council, would have been accepted, the University **Education Departments would** have been closed down," said P K Sahoo, president of Indian Association of Teacher Education (IATE).

10 cos join to test drones for news reporting

a coalition of 10 news organisations, including The New York Times, The Washington Post and NBCUniversal, has formed a partnership with Virginia Tech to test drones for newsgathering, the companies said Thursday.

The partnership, the com-

panies said in a statement, is "designed to conduct controlled safety testing of a series of real-life scenarios where the news media could use small UAS technology to gather the news."

The college is one of six sites designated by the Federal Aviation Administration for testing of unmanned aircraft systems, or UAS.

The other members of the coalition are Advance Publications, A H Belo, The Associated Press, Gannett, Getty Images, E W Scripps Co and Sinclair Broadcast Group.


Unmanned aircraft systems, said Rose Mooney, executive director of the Mid-Atlantic Aviation Partnership at Virginia Tech, "can provide this industry a safe, efficient, timely and affordable way to gather and disseminate information and keep journalists out of harm's way."

Drones have long been coveted by news organisations for their potential to transform newsgathering in dangerous situations, such as natural disasters, and to offer the organisations a vantage point they would not normally get without expensive helicopters or planes.

But, citing safety concerns, the FAA has granted only limited permission for drone flights while it writes suitable regulations.

This week, CNN announced that it had also been cleared to test drones for newsgathering.

Union Human Resources Development Minister <u>Smriti Irani</u> said on Saturday that a task force would be constituted soon to expedite setting up of Central education institutes, as assured in the state reorganization act, in Andhra Pradesh.

Irani laid the foundation stone of a new Indian Institute of Management at Gambhiram village in Anandapuram mandal of <u>Visakhapatnam</u> district. Irani's assurance came in response to a request made by the Chief Minister N Chandrababu Naidu. The NDA government was committed to bring in best of the reforms in the education sector, she said.

Union Urban Development Minister Venkaiah Naidu, who was also present on the occasion, said the economic reforms were "the need of the hour".
