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PANEL FAILS TO DELIVER MODEL, IIT AUTONOMY MAY TAKE, A HIT

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NEW DELHI: Owing to the lack of a politically acceptable alternative funding model, the Indian Institutes of Technology (IIT) may continue to depend on the government for up to 75% of their financial requirements.

But directors of the premier engineering schools may soon be selected by the institute boards rather than the government, under a much-awaited blueprint for the future of HTs, multiple sources privy to the document has said

The blueprint drafted by a panel set up by the HRD minister under former atomic energy chief Anil Kakodkar—is scheduled to be presented to Kapil Sibal on Thursday. The HRD ministry is likely to form a fresh panel to examine the proposals of the Kakodkar panel.

As reported by HT on April 23, the panel has proposed that students' fees he used to finance only up to 25% of the recurring costs of the HTs—after the HRD ministry objected to a plan to fund the entire financial requirements of the HTs through fees.

The Kakodkar panel has sug-

gested a mild hike in fees — that too gradual — and has proposed that the IITs use their resources more efficiently and market their research better to increase their generation of funds.

But the IITs have repeatedly failed to generate adequate funds through research, consultancies and alumni donations.

The panel recommendation to allow boards of governors (BoGs) — instead of government selection teams — to pick directors is unlikely to be easily acceptable to IIT heads, source said.

Benefits to evade IIT staff

BARRED The institute amends statutes to stop employees on deputation from drawing privileges

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NEW DELHI: Indian Institute of Technology, Kharagpur, has barred employees on deputa-tion to other institutions from drawing benefits from the IIT, after HT revealed how its former deputy director was simultaneously receiving medical benefits from two institutions. IIT Bhubaneswar director Madhusudhan Chakraborty, who was deputy director of HT Kharagpur till 2009, was drawing medical benefits from both IITs, drawing allegations of misusing public resources, as this newspaper first reported on February 27.

The IIT Kharagpur board of governors, at a meeting on March 4, decided not to allow ht IMPACT

employees who have taken up assignments at other organi-sations to seek benefits while

on deputation or lien.

Chakraborty will also be asked to repay the costs of the benefits he drew from Kharagpur while at

IIT Bhubaneswar.
"The board also decided that such employees who are currently on lien/extraordinary leave and have availed allowances, benefits including LTC and medical facilities of BC Roy Technology Hospital be requested to pay the cost of all benefits," the registrar said in a note to the institute community.

Chakraborty had argued that

he was drawing on medicines and consultation from IIT Kharagpur since "they know my medical history and are the best judge for medication administration". The HT director argued that he also needed to use medicine facilities at HT Bhubaneswar for emergencies when consultants were unavailable at HT Kharagour

He had claimed that he was

entitled to use medical facilities from both the institutes But top officials at the HRD ministry questioned his claim, dismissing his argument that an official can draw benefits from two institutions.

Charaborty also faces questions in a CBI probe into alleged irregularities in laboratory equipment purchased by HT Bhubaneswar.

AIEEE: Students unsatisfied

SORRY AFFAIR They say re-exam on Wednesday was the toughest in many years; the whole process was faulty

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NEW DELHI: Many of the 34,000 students who appeared for the All India Engineering Entrance Examination (AIEEE) re-examination on Wednesday were an unsatisfied lot.

Claiming that the paper they had to write was the toughest in many years; the students cried hoarse saying that the whole process was faulty.

The students were forced to reappear for the exam as the paper had been leaked on May 1. More than 34,000 students could not take the exam then (on May 1) as it was postponed by three hours and clashed with another entrance exam. The students were given a different date, dividing the exam in two

"Physics was extremely difficult. I have never seen this tough a paper at the level of AIEEE. Mathematics was all right but chemistry was quite easy. But if I were to compare this with the earlier exam, it was certainly tougher," said Dibankar Jha, an aspirant whose centre was at RK Puram, sector 2.

Students, both who had taken the test earlier and who took it on Wednesday, say that the decision to hold exams in two phases was unjust.

Mixed reaction to AIEEE re-test

While Some Said The Paper Was Comparatively Easy, Others Differed

New Delhi: The All India Engineering/Architecture Entrance Examination (AIEEE) 2011 was conducted smoothly on Wednesday but the students who had appeared for the test on May 1 said the rescheduled paper was comparatively easy. Schoolteachers and students who took the test on Wednesday, however, said the difficulty level of the both the papers was the same.

Over 34,000 AIEEE aspirants who could not take the test on May 1 due to a paper leak in Lucknow appeared for the rescheduled examination on Wednesday. On May 1, the exam was conducted after a three-hour delay but these students either had to appear for the Armed Forces Medical Course (AFMC) test the same afternoon or their centre was engaged for same other test. The rescheduled test was conducted in 95 centres across 39 cities.

After completing the exam at Air Force Bal Bharati School, Lodhi Road, Suhasini Nair, a Class XII student, said, "The paper is almost the same as the previous one. With the benefit of hindsight I can say that I could have attempted the same number of questions on May 1 as I have done today."

Students who had appeared for the test on May 1 disagreed.

Suman (name changed) said, "The exam on May 1 was of much higher level and today's paper seemed simpler. It was completely based on NCERT books."

Principal of Ahlcon International School, Mayur Vihar, Ashok Pandey, said, "Overall, the difficulty level has been same. My students from May 1 and May 11 batch said there is little difference between the two papers. CBSE always keeps back-up papers of parallel difficulty, so there is no chance of anyone getting un-

due advantage. The fact that they could reorganize and conduct the test for over 10 lakh students on May 1 speaks volumes about CBSE's ability to manage crisis."

Dipankar Mukherjee, chemistry teacher of Springdales, Pusa Road, differs. "I am speaking purely as a parent and not as a teacher. I have not done a comparative study of the two papers but the difficulty level of two papers can never be the same and CBSE should have conducted the exam afresh for all students." he said.

The CBSE conducts AIEEE for admission to National Institutes of Technology, Indian Institutes of Information Technology, deemed universities and many state institutions offering engineering and architecture courses. According to CBSE officials, the board takes contingency measures for any untoward incident. The difficulty level has not been compromised as they had set up an expert committee just for setting the paper to be held on Wednesday.

the civil services exam with a vow to fight graft.


"It takes more than a wish to become a civil servant. She is an intelligent person with a lot of perseverance. She'll make a good administrator," said Deepika J, who studied with her in the School of Excellence in Law under The Tamil Nadu Dr Ambedkar Law University.

"When I was in college, I noticed a lot that I didn't like many things about the system of governance," Divyadharshini said. "So I decided to get into the system to change it."

Successful in her second attempt at the exam, the 24-year-old said her first attempt when she was in her college final year in 2009 was a shot in the dark. "I put in a lot of hard work in it, but I didn't know how to go about the whole process," Divydarshini said. This time she took a year off to concentrate on the exams, put in 10% extra effort and made the cut.

It's not all about studies for the young woman, whose day begins at 6am. She spends four to five hours, five days a week preparing for the exam. Father Shan-

muggam said he was surprised over her ranking. "Most of the time I found her watching cricket. I didn't expect her to make it to the very top," he said. It is a first-of-a-kind experience for Divyadharshini, who got 1% less than distinction in Class 10 in Asan Memorial Senior Secondary School, Egmore and 86% in Class 12. In college, she was among the top five.

New Delhi: The top two slots in the Civil Services Examination 2011 have gone to women: S Divyadharshini and Sweta Mohanty. Of the 547,698 candidates who appeared for the preliminary exam held in May 2010, 920 made the grade.

There are 151 vacancies for IAS, IFS (35) and IPS (150). The result of two candidates has been withheld, and candidature of 39 candidates has been declared provisional. The consolidated reserve list includes 242 candidates.

Twenty eight physically challenged, 14 orthopaedically challenged, five visually impaired and nine hearing impaired got selected. While,148 are from the scheduled castes, scheduled tribes (74) and other backward classes (270). The list can be accessed on the websites of Press Information Bureau and Union Public Service Commission. The marks are expected to be published within a fortnight.

New Delhi: A first-generation civil servant, Ajay Prakash, led the pack of over 10 students of Jawaharlal Nehru University (JNU) who have come out successful in the Civil Services Examination, 2010, on Wednesday And he described his rank of 9 among the final 920 candidates as something he had never dreamt of.

Also on Wednesday, there were celebrations at All India Institute of Medical Sciences, over its junior resident doctor of neuro radiology, Aditya Dahiya, a topper throughout his career, ranking 21. With the result, Dr Dahiya was all set to realize his dream of pursuing a career in civil services. And both of them have cracked the exams in their very first attempt.

An ecstatic Prakash, who is from Bihar, said the greatest influence on him has been the JNU environment. "It is be-

cause of the JNU environment that I managed to be among the top 10. I never thought I would be even among the top 100 and that itself would have been a dream come true. To rank ninth is unbelievable," said Prakash, whose roll number is 002040.

A student of MPhil in English in JNU, Prakash had done his BA (H) in English from Hindu College, and his immediate reaction to news of his success was that of relief that he would not have to ap-

pear for the exams again. "As a civil servant I would like the bureaucracy to keep the common man in the centre of all its decisions and the common man should never be afraid of the government machinery. Civil servants should be the servants of the masses and not masters as is the case now. This is what I will try to practise," said Prakash, whose inspiration has been his mother.

And he minced no words in praising his alma mater. "JNU has a dynamic intellectual en-

vironment and is a dream place. It is a beacon of freedom. Even though I don't subscribe to the left ideology, the best part of JNU is that all voices are respected," said Prakash. Dahiya has been a topper all his life. He topped the CBSE AIPMT 2005 and then went on to top AIIMS 2010 exams.

A practising doctor at AI-IMS, he is from Sonepat and all members of his family (father, mother and elder sister) are doctors. "Administrative services has been my natural inclination and I decided to appear for the civil services and join the administration to serve the nation," said Dahiya. Another successful civil service aspirant among top 100 from JNU was Suchitra Kishore, who ranked 39 overall. She is a PhD scholar and had cleared the exams in her third attempt and her first choice is Indian Foreign Services.

1st pedal-powered copter set to fly

A Frail Woman Will Pedal With Hands & Feet To Keep The 60ft Chopper Afloat

London: A university team in the US is all set to propel into the history books when it test-flies the world's first-ever human-powered helicopter on Thursday.

While basic planes without engines have been launched by humans for decades, no one in the world has yet found a way to make a pedal-powered helicopter stay in the air for more than a few seconds.

After two years of gruelling work, 50 engineers from the University of Maryland in the US are set to launch their creation for the first time, the 'Daily Mail' reported. The University of Maryland's helicopter, named Gamera, is a huge 60 foot long and each rotor is 42 feet in diameter. Despite its size, which stretches across about a third of a football field, the whole model, made from carbon fibre, foam and balsa wood, weighs just 140 pounds, say its makers.

Aaron Harrington, an aerospace engineer-

ing student at Maryland, said he decided to join the team after one of his professors "came to me and said he had this really awesome idea". "I thought it's an awesome idea and really interesting challenge," he added.

The chopper will attempt to be flown by Judy Wexler, 24, a biology student, who will sit beneath the X-shaped frame and furiously pedal with her hands and feet. She has been chosen because she is light and, as a competitive cyclist, has a very strong power-to-weight ratio.

If Wexler succeeds in keeping the helicopter off the ground for a minute and manage to get it to rise to a height of three metres, the team will win an award of \$250,000 and make history by becoming the first ever to achieve the feat. The Sikorsky prize was established in 1980 by the American Helicopter Society to encourage people to strive to achieve the first controlled flight of a human powered helicopter.

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7.5m minor social-site users at high risk

Boston: Facebook has 7.5 million users who are underage and are "not supposed" to be using the social networking site, according to a new report. Of the 20 million minors who actively used Facebook in the past year, more than one-third or about 7.5 million were younger than 13 and not supposed to be able to use the site, Consumer Reports, an American consumer advocacy publication, said in a study.

Among the young users, more than five million were 10 years and under, whose accounts were largely unsupervised by their parents. One million children were harassed, threatened and subjected to cyberbullying on the site in the past year. The study said majority of parents of 10-year olds and younger kids were "largely unconcerned" about their child using the site.

"Despite Facebook's age requirements, many kids are using the site who should not be," consumer reports technology editor said. PTI

THE Super League 2 comprises Department of Management Studies, IIT-Delhi, New Delhi; Faculty of Management Studies, Delhi University; Great Lakes Institute of Management, Chennai; Indian Institute of Foreign Trade, New Delhi; Indian Institute of Management, Kozhikode; Indian Institute of Management Lucknow, Institute of Management, Nirma University, Ahmedabad; Institute of Management Technology, Nagpur, International Management Institute, New Delhi: K J Somaiva Institute of Management Studies & Research, Mumbai; and Shailesh J Mehta School of Management, Mumbai.

B-Schools have been placed in an alphabetical order. That is why, in the Super League 1, Indian Institute of Management, Ahmedabad, is on top and XL-RI is at the bottom, although on the basis of the overall score, it could be the other way round.

The survey ranks participating B-schools on parameters such as intellectual capital, admissions & placements, infrastructure, industry interface and governance. According to the publication: "These have been framed and vetted by industry leaders and found to be the most appropriate. These can be measured objectively, leaving no scope for misrepresentation of

Each parameter has been assigned a weight according to an expert committee's directions. The final score is, therefore, a weighted aggregate. The final scores are used to put the schools in different categories.

This year we have done two things to make the survey more user-friendly and comprehensive. The publication has been brought forward keeping in mind the needs of its core users, industry and students. More important, the methodology has been refreshed to make the exercise more robust and inclu-

sive. While the self-audit method of arriving at classification is fairly robust, we felt a need to increase the scope of the data. The methodology, therefore, was expanded to include the views of other stakeholders, namely talent managers and B-School graduates working in various organisations.

The approach, therefore, merges the best of both worlds a self-audit and an external rating by industry. In other words, it's a 360-degree method.

Our methodology keeps "self-styled" B-Schools out. The survey covers only institutes recognised by the All India Council for Technical Education, an industry body. The other requirement is that at least two batches should have graduated. Questionnaires were sent to 1,266 B-Schools. As many as 237 sent entries within the stipulated time. We rejected four entries due to incomplete information and other related issues."
